

Solastalgia and Recovery

Feelings of anxiety feed into a kind of homesickness when community, home and identity are disturbed – this distress, caused by environmental change, is also called solastalgia.

In the township of Lobethal, the old Woollen Mill is responding to many of the community needs in practical and creative ways through Fabrik Arts + Heritage, the Adelaide Hills Council, and the State and Federal Governments.

3 INCONVENIENT TRUTHS: This past week as I prepared for a funeral, I was reminded of three inconvenient truths.

The first 'truth' that struck me was what we call 'global warming' Over 30 years ago in 1989: Al Gore, began a campaign aimed at alerting the public to what he saw as an increasing "planetary emergency" due to global warming. A docu-

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mentary of his campaign was made into a film in 2006. The film was fittingly called AN INCONVENIENT TRUTH:

Initially he was ridiculed, mocked, and ignored; accused of scaremongering by those who didn't want to know, 30 years on those who deny what is n o w c o n s i d e r e d "scientific fact" are the ones who are ridiculed and mocked.

The second 'inconvenient truth' that struck me as I prepared for the funeral is that death is a reality. As much as we may try to ignore it, we all have an appointment with death at some stage along this journey we call life. Some of us may see it coming and others will be caught by surprise, but the end result will be the same. It has been well observed that Funeral Directors always have someone in need of their services.

The third inconvenient truth' is only inconvenient for some, perhaps most people. This is that Jesus Christ lived, died and rose again from the dead, and that those who place their faith in Him will also rise from their deaths to live forever. In fact, the Scriptures tell us that if we believe in Jesus we will not experience death at all, but simply move on into another realm.

The apostle Paul, who met with Jesus after His resurrection, tell us that "to be absent from our bodies is to be present with the Lord."

Many people these days find this a very inconvenient truth, Why, because most people <u>prefer</u> to believe that God doesn't exist, because most people want to do what they like, and God will only get in the way.

God's creation clearly witnesses to His existence. The amazing order and complexity found in living things is a very inconvenient truth which cannot be denied. It surely takes much more faith to believe that blind chance brought about all that we see around us than it takes to believe in God.

In fact, God declares that unbelievers are "without excuse." Jesus said to His disciple Thomas, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me.

John 3:16 For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life.

Because you matter to God, He offers you the gift of eternal life, if you will believe in Jesus.

Admirable start to the year for Mt Pleasant Farmers Market

At the recent Australia Day celebrations, the Mount Pleasant Farmers Market was awarded the 2019 Australia Day Community Award, presented to Market Manager, Genevieve Hebart. Mt Pleasant Community Association Inc. Chairperson Paula Bartsch said, "This community award is for the Management and the Stall Holders who, during the Cudlee Creek fires responded under extremely trying conditions to not only open for our community, but also for those who had been evacuated from their homes."

Mt Pleasant Farmers Market Chairperson Ashlev Dent said, "That indicates clearly that a very strong sentiment of gratitude runs throughout our community for the decisions made that weekend. Obviously, no organisation can actively encourage risk for any of its people, however, paradoxically bravery and courage can seldom exist without it. We're unable to rewrite that weekend or alter the decisions made. however. clearly enough of our community felt compelled to illustrate their thankfulness for our Market over that challenging weekend."

In the following weeks



after the Adelaide Hills fires the market held a bushfire recovery appeal and raised just over \$4000 on a single market morning. On appeal day, market management donated all stallholder fees, all gold coin donations offered at the gate and market stallholders generously donated a percentage of their takings.

In further response to the Adelaide Hills fires the market proudly has formed an alliance with the Upper Torrens River Landcare Group, Seeding Natives Inc., Barossa Bush Gardens, Mt Pleasant Natural Resource Centre Inc., Cudlee Creek Fire - Garden Recovery, and Kersbrook Landcare Group Inc. to aid in re-vegetation for those affected by fires. As part of the project plan, the Alliance will be holding a series of volunteer workshops over the coming months at the market. These workshops are part of the long-term plan for the bushfire recovery effort with which the market will be involved.

The market also celebrated its 8th birthday early in February. Boasting many achievements in their eight years, including over \$100,000 raised through market initiatives, Market Members were the instigators of the fundraising and building of the community atrium, and the new toilet facilities at the Mount Pleasant Showground. The market initiated and continues to support the SA Spring Garden Festival, a major event for the township of Mt Pleasant, along with Mt Pleasant SALA exhibition, and in past years has hosted amazing regional Tasting Australia events.

The arts bring communities together and aid recovery; a concept not only supported globally, but also through the overwhelmingly positive results of past artistic events at the Lobethal Woollen Mill.

Melinda Rankin, Director of Fabrik said, 'The arts have much to offer the recovery of our community ... [and] to be most effective, our offerings need to be informed by the community's needs. ... If we can't be here for the community now, when can we be?

In response to community requests, several events are planned at Fabrik, including the rescheduled Gathered Design market. This market. run bv Woodside local Ienna O'Dell. was initially planned for December 20-22 but was cancelled due to the Cudlee Creek Fire. The renamed Re:Gathered market will be held from 11am to 7pm, on the weekend of the

8th and 9th of February at the Mill. Several workshops will also run throughout the community: 'Ukulele Workshop' at the Lobethal Bierhaus: 'Wire Sculpture Workshop' at the Amberlight Motorcycle Café; and 'Sewing for Wildlife Workshop' on the green at Mill Square. 




An Eye On Marble Hill Nature, photography by Greg Cramond

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
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
