Farmers Market celebrates 10 years at Mt Pleasant

February 5, 2022, marks ten years for the town of Mt Pleasant and their ever-popular farmers market. The market has had much to celebrate in their ten years of trading. It has every week given local and neighbouring communities the opportunity to shop local for their fresh food produce, to support SA growers, and a place to socialise. With the market membership constant at 500 members, the market is still going strong after 10 vears.

Retiring Market Co-Manager Genevieve Hebart said, "The gate fundraising initiative proudly sits as one of the massive achievements the market has supported, with almost \$130,000 being collected by local community groups, through gate donations on market days and then fed back into those participating groups."

Co-Manager Terese said "The market has also made an impact at the showgrounds & caravan park with improvements to the show/market hall infrastructure and building of the community's undercover wisteria atrium.



With the help of the People & Places Grant and The Barossa Council, local and market communities have raised the extra funds needed to complete and modernise the kitchen facilities in the catering shed and also to build a new much needed toilet and shower block. The showground has also had a facelift with some murals painted on the existing buildings by local artist Graeme Westwood. Murals depicting the history of the region."

"The market has been supplying the Mt Pleasant community with an ATM every market day since opening and with the closure of the local bank, this too has been a real benefit to both the local community and to the travellers staying in the caravan park."

"The market introduced a major drawcard event in the SA Spring Garden Festival in 2016.which has brought a different audience to Mt Pleasant. The event is run in conjunction with the Farmers Market, and pre covid drew 3500 people to the Mt Pleasant district for the one-day event. Our other major events on the market calendar are the very successful Twilight Christmas, Easter Farmers Market and Bee Day events which attracts a surge of people to the town."

A full calendar of events is planned for the 10th birthday celebrations. Market stalchef wart, celebrity Simon Bryant (pictured left), will be returning to the market to celebrate. Simon with his effervescent personality and quick wit is sure to be a crowd pleaser. Simon attended the opening of the market 10 years ago and has been a staunch supporter since. On the birthday market day, he will be showcasing the diverse products of the market, in an inspired cooking demonstration. Simon will be at market on Saturday 5 February, 2022.

A gala dinner event will also be held in Mt Pleasant, to announce and present market stalwarts and life members with awards. Chelsea Honner, incoming Co-Manager "The event will host and reunite the many stall holders, volunteers, members and staff that have been involved with the community not- for- profit group over the past ten years."

The Mt Pleasant Farmers Market is open every Saturday between 8am and 12 noon at the Mt Pleasant Showgrounds.

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TO BE OR NOT TO BE? Local Theatre club faces closure after 23 years.

Top of the Torrens Theatre Group, based in Mount Pleasant, are facing closure from diminishing membership. At the upcoming AGM, there are likely to be vacancies for all of the office bearing positions as the reduced volunteer base for the club has been further reduced due to age and ill health of some adult members.

The club has staged popular performances about twice a year, specialising in comedy and musicals, bringing homespun entertainment that sends people away with a smile on their face. Previously, shows were held in surrounding nearby towns, but in recent years, the resetting for different venues has been too taxing, so all the shows of each season have been presented in the home town of M o u n t P l e a s a n t. The last two years have been difficult with COVID restric-



tions, but one well received show 'LOVE! LOVE? LOVE...' was successfully presented in May 2021 and enjoyed by over 300 faithful regulars and new audience alike. The club has seen a recent increase in budding and enthusiastic young members, with some of them participating at committee level, but many more adult volunteers would be necessary for the continuance of the club.

Two special meetings are scheduled at the Mount Pleasant Soldier's Memorial Hall for 7pm Friday 4th and **11th February**. The first will be open to the public to discuss the future of the club and give an opportunity for persons willing to be involved a chance to register their interest and meet the current members. The second meeting will be for members only to vote for, or against, the proposal to wind up the club. The opportunity to become a member for half price will be available at the first meetings and the start of the second meeting. COVID restrictions will be adhered to at both meetings. All Three Levels of Government Call for New Hills Hospital

Local, State and Federal leaders in the Hills are calling for a funding commitment for a new Hills Hospital with the issue set to take centre-stage in an election year.

Mayor of the Mount Barker District Council, Ann Ferguson OAM said the growing population in the Hills justified the investment:

"As a result of State Government planning decisions, our population is booming. We need to plan now for a new multi-storey hospital for the Hills with a surgery ward, a full pathology lab and paediatric wing. We can't build piecemeal add-ons at the Mount Barker Hospital site in an attempt to catch-up to current demand," Mayor Ferguson said.

Federal Member for Mayo, Rebekha Sharkie MP, said \$11M in Federal funding had been secured for an ED upgrade at the site, including an additional \$3M in December 2021, but that was a stop-gap measure.

"Only by building a new Hospital in the Hills can we adequately address future demand. We need to be planning for the needs of future generations in the Hills and that work must start now," Ms Sharkie said.

Member for Kavel, Dan Cregan MP, said government decisions meant a new city was effectively being built at Mount Barker.

"There is huge growth in the Hills from Mt Barker to Lobethal. The Hills are not just another suburb of Adelaide. We are a unique district with acute and growing healthcare needs. Frankly, the government should scrap plans to build a new city stadium and invest in a periurban hospital at Mount Barker to take pressure off the whole network, including locally in the Hills," Mr Cregan added.

Healthcare services are a significant issue in the Adelaide Hills, with more than 3000 people signing a petition for additional ambulance services. A single ambulance has served the growing Mount Barker community since 1992.

As well, Hills locals have been calling for the Gumeracha Hospital Emergency Department to be re-opened after it closed through a combination of funding complexities and COVID safety measures. Over 2,500 people have signed a petition calling on the government to reopen the Gumeracha Hospital ED.

Between 2018 and 2021 presentations to the Mount Barker Hospital ED increased by 21%, with over 12,000 patients presenting in 2018, rising to over 19,000 in 2021.

This is just what the power station needed-some love and attention to regain the prominence within the community that it once had. The Ambleside Milling and Lighting Company opened the power station in 1925 and provided electricity to the district including Lobethal. Oakbank. Balhannah. Charleston and Mount Torrens, up to 1946. In 1949, the Onkaparinga District Council acquired the site for council chambers and community purposes, that included the Onkaparinga District Fire Unit.

"Chantelle's commitment to fostering a positive school culture across new campuses is a remarkable achievement for any individual, let alone someone so young," said Mayor Wisdom.

"The social awareness and natural empathy that Chantelle has demonstrated will undoubtedly serve her well throughout her life."

Finally, Lobethal's inaugural Gardening Festival has taken out the Community Event of the Year 2022, in recognition of a huge collaborative effort of passionate locals wanting to provide a focus for the recovering community.

This brand new event, which brought together multiple environmental agencies and local households, was established to promote wellbeing through gardening and an appreciation of nature.

"The Lobethal Gardening Festival was a hugely successful event held in times when

community events have become especially difficult to coordinate safely," said Mayor Wisdom.

"The event committee, formed beneath the Lobethal Commerce Association, are incredibly deserving of this accolade and we hope to see their event continue and grow into the future."

An additional 10 Civic Awards were also presented to Adelaide Hills locals who demonstrated excellence in supporting or inspiring their communities through acts of selflessness and generosity.
